PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING OVERVIEW

The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT), Greenville-Pickens Area Transportation Study (GPATS), City of Mauldin, and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), thank you for your participation in this Public Information Meeting. PURPOSE OF THE MEETING

The purpose of this meeting is to provide an opportunity for you to review, comment on, and discuss the proposed project. Another purpose of the meeting is to gather information from the public or any interested organization on historic or cultural resources in the area. The proposed project design was developed with feedback from project stakeholders and preliminary technical studies, including traffic analysis and environmental impact analyses.

PROJECT OVERVIEW

SCDOT, in conjunction with GPATS, the City of Mauldin, and FHWA, propose to improve East Butler Road (S-107) in the city of Mauldin for approximately 1.7 miles from US 276 (N. Main Street) to the Mauldin Senior Center entrance on East Butler Road. The project is located about 1 mile south of the I-385 interchange at Butler Road in Greenville County.

PROJECT PURPOSE AND NEED

The purpose of the project is to improve the operational efficiency, including improvements to the existing bicycle-pedestrian (bike-ped) facilities, along East Butler Road between US 276 (N. Main Street) and the Mauldin Senior Center entrance.

FUNDING

GPATS is the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the Greenville urbanized area. The MPO is tasked, in accordance with federal requirements, with creating a Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP), and Transportation Improvement Project (TIP), as well as developing a Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The TIP is the regions' short-range program that schedules funding for transportation projects to be implemented over a six-year cycle. The most recent TIP (for fiscal years 2021-2026) identifies the Butler Road Improvements Project to receive \$17 million beginning in 2019, which includes design, right-of-way acquisition, and construction.

NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY ACT

Because federal funds are being used to develop the proposed project, FHWA is the lead agency and requires preparation of an environmental document to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). As part of the NEPA process, federal agencies must fully evaluate the proposed project's impacts to the human and natural environment, examine reasonable alternatives for the improvements, and provide opportunities for federal, state, and local agencies and the public to provide input during the development of the project. The environmental review is completed to avoid, minimize, or mitigate environmental impacts and to ensure public participation is incorporated into the decision-making process. The environmental document identifies the purpose and need of the project, analyzes alternatives that may meet the purpose and need, and recommends a preferred alternative based on an impact analysis and public input. A proactive public involvement process will be an integral component of the project. Input regarding the project's purpose and need, public outreach methods, alternatives development, and identification of a preferred alternative is welcomed.

Every effort is made to minimize impacts to the human and natural environment during the development of the project. For this reason potential impacts to wetlands, streams, farmlands, threatened and endangered species, floodplains, and archaeological or historical sites are evaluated as part of the NEPA process. Mitigating impacts to the human environment also include ensuring environmental justice (EJ), or fair treatment and meaningful involvement of all people regardless of race, color, national origin, or income with respect to the transportation decision making process. When minority and low-income populations (EJ communities) may be affected, SCDOT must determine whether there is a disproportionately high and adverse impact on the population. If impacts are anticipated, avoidance is considered first, and then minimization and mitigation of impacts.

Community impacts such as right-of-way acquisition and property owner relocations are also considered as a part of the NEPA process. While minimal right-of-way acquisition is a goal, some right-of-way will need to be acquired by SCDOT to facilitate the project. All right-of-way will be acquired in conformance with the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, or the Uniform Act.
